1) (10 x 1p, max 8 p) Multichoice statements. There are 1-4 correct answers, but choose one and only one. Fill in into a separate form, which will be read optically.

- 1.1 Examine a polynomial $f(x) = x^{2008} + 1$.
 - (A) All possible roots are $x = \pm j$
 - (B) One root is $x = j + \pi/2008$
 - (C) Roots are on a circle with radius r, equally spaced with angle θ , where r = 1 and $\theta = \pi/2008$
 - (D) None of above is true
- 1.2 Sequence $x[n] = (\sum_{k=-\infty}^{\infty} \delta[n-3k]) + \cos((\pi/7)n) 2\sin((\pi/2)n)$
 - (A) is not periodic
 - (B) is periodic and its fundamental period $N_0 = 84$
 - (C) is periodic and its fundamental period $N_0 = 168$
 - (D) is periodic with period N = 420
- 1.3 Compute the linear convolution $y[n] = h[n] \circledast x[n]$ of impulse response $h[n] = \delta[n+1] + 4\delta[n] 2\delta[n-2] \delta[n-3]$ and input $x[n] = \delta[n+1] - 0.84\delta[n] - 0.231\delta[n-1] + 0.72\delta[n-3] - \delta[n-4] - \delta[n-5]$
 - (A) $y[n] = \{1, 3.16, \underline{-5.591}, 0.476, 3.182, -6.2090, -2.72, 3, -1\}$
 - **(B)** $y[n] = \{\underline{0}, 0, 1, 3.16, -5.591, 0.476, 3.182, -6.2090, -2.72, -3, 1\}$
 - (C) $y[n] = \{1, 3.16, \underline{-3.591}, -2.924, 1.4, 3.182, -4.769, -5.44, 1.28, 3, 1\}$
 - **(D)** $y[n] = \{1, -3.36, 0, 0, -0.72\}$
- 1.4 Two-point moving average filter
 - (A) is of IIR type
 - (B) order is 2
 - (C) is lowpass filter
 - (D) structure contains a feedback loop

1.5 The highest frequency component in a continuous-time signal is $f_h = 5$ kHz. No aliasing happens

- (A) when sampling frequency f_T is smaller than 10 kHz
- (B) when using sampling frequency $f_T = 5.0001 \text{ kHz}$
- (C) when using sampling period T > 5 seconds
- (D) if sampling period is smaller than 0.1 milliseconds
- 1.6 Real-valued sequence x[n]:
 - (A) discrete-time Fourier transform (DTFT) is periodic with 2π

- 1.7 The impulse response of LTI filter is $h[n] = \delta[n] + \delta[n 2008]$.

 - (B) Filter is symmetric comb filter
 - (C) Phase response $\angle H(e^{j\omega})$ is nonlinear
 - (D) Filter is not stable

- 1.8 The transfer function of LTI filter is $H(z) = \frac{1}{1-1.2z^{-1}+0.35z^{-2}}$.
 - (A) Amplitude response is in Figure 1(a)
 - (B) Amplitude response is in Figure 1(b)
 - (C) Pole-zero plot is in Figure 1(c)
 - (D) Filter is of allpass type
- 1.9 Transfer function is $H(z) = \frac{1}{1+0.8z^{-1}} \cdot \frac{1}{1+1.2z^{-1}}$ with region of convergence (ROC) |z| < 0.8. Inverse transform is then
 - (A) $h[n] = 2h[n-1] + 0.96h[n-2] 2\delta[n] + 3\delta[n-1]$
 - **(B)** $h[n] = -2 \cdot (-5/4)^{-n-1} \mu[-n-1] + 3 \cdot (-5/6)^{-n-1} \mu[-n-1]$
 - (C) $h[n] = -2 \cdot (-4/5)^{-n-1} \mu[-n-1] + 3 \cdot (-6/5)^{-n-1} \mu[-n-1]$
 - (D) $h[n] = -2.5 \cdot (-5/4)^{-n-1} \mu[-n-1] + 2.5 \cdot (-5/6)^{-n-1} \mu[-n-1]$

1.10 Block diagram of the filter in Figure 2 is analyzed with Matlab. Correct commands are

2) (6p) In the beginning of this course we have analyzed digital signals and linear and time-invariant (LTI) filters. The analysis is both in time and frequency domain as shown in Figure 3.

Let us examine now the case in Figure 4. There is a pure cosine sequence x[n] with fundamental period $N_0 = 4$ as input. It is filtered with an LTI filter, which is given by a pole-zero plot. Zeros are at $d_1 = -0.5$ and $d_2 = \frac{1}{-0.5} = -2$, whereas all poles are in the origin. Note that one cannot see amplification G in pole-zero plot. Output sequence is given in rightmost figure; the amplitude of the cosine has remained unchanged.
